

St Helens trail ride

What is a stellar trail horse?

any of us riders here on the ranch, if not the vast majority, are trail riders, after all that's why I moved to CRR. Many think that going down the trail is simple and easy with no special training needed. Some are successful or shall I say lucky with that concept, many are not.

I reached out to former horse show judge Rebecca Herron, owner of Perrydale Trails in Sheridan Oregon <u>www.perrydaletrails.com</u> to get her idea of that *stellar* trail horse. Believe me, Rebecca has seen it all.

Rebecca's first sentence to me was, "Both horse and rider must be well trained with all of the basics firmly established. Whoa, reining, leg aids, are obeyed at all times."

That's not to say that has to be done in an arena, those ques can and should be established and reinforced anytime you're on your horses back. The horse must stand tied quietly as well as stand to be mounted and not move until given a que to do so. The horse should be nonreactive, such as, if it sees a deer or something they have never seen before, they don't react in a negative way, like bolting or spooking. The horse should be alert, aware, and curious but not frightened.

If we expect the horse to be quiet, the rider should be as well. Pay attention to what you AND your horse are doing. If you're riding along gabbing or daydreaming and your horse is grabbing snacks along the way, its probably not going to be a very pleasant ride.

Let your horse figure some things out for himself, bullying and forcing a horse to do something is counterproductive to having a willing partner. Its never a bad idea to have a steady eddy, or Mentor for your horses first few rides, they learn not to be fearful or reactive that way.

Most of all have fun, trust your horse (*to a point*) and he will learn to trust you.



alph Waldo Emerson is quoted saying "the first wealth is health." A concept by Pamela Peeke, MD, asks are you fit to live and are you fit to survive. Her book Fit to Live (Rodale 2007) spawned a Discovery show titled, Could you Survive? Dr. Peeke surmised that more than physical fitness was needed to survive daily life and handle curveballs. Dr. Peeke suggests that to be fit-to-live five critical elements must be woven together for success.

Successfully adjusting to change by adaptation and resilience is the goal of mental fitness. A study revealed those embraced hard work, accepting hardship, throughout their lives and by learning new skills and habits as they aged were less likely affected by stressors such as change. Meditation and practicing mindfulness are recommended.

Proper Nutrition, is essential to being fit to live. The American diet continues to consist of overly refined foods. Since the brain will ultimately be the recipient of food consumed, a poor diet can disturb systems in the brain and stress management.

Functional *physical* fitness is key to keeping the physical body strong enough to combat stressors. Functional fitness mimics work in normal activities; balancing, twisting, bending, pulling and pushing. Aerobic exercise has a profound positive effect on cognition, brain structure, behavior and psychosocial functioning.

Create a healthy, nurturing *environment* where you work, live and play. Create a calm and orderly indoor environment. Outdoors can be a place for healing; spending time outside elevates the mood.

Financial health directly impacts the other 4 factors. Lower incomes are three-times more likely to have physical limitations and disabilities due to chronic illness. Return to play, to survival. Get outside; walk, hike, play games, ride a bike - think like you had to do the activity to survive, to fight a battle.

RANCH BULLETIN BOARD BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

November 20, 2023

- The meeting was called to order by President Vickery. All Directors were present with the exception of Director Jones.
- Ranch Manager LaPora noted that plans are coming together for the Western Christmas celebration. Meetings have been scheduled with all supervisors to review their Capital Reserve Budgets for FY 2025.
- Secretary Dries reported if the Forest Service Grant is approved, all matching costs must be paid by the Ranch upfront. We will not be pursuing this grant, instead, waiting for a BLM grant in the spring.
- Director Erdekian will schedule a work party for Saturday November 25 to gather and burn the Russian Thistle in the Lower Pasture. He will provide burn barrels. Start time will be 9:00 am. Notices will be sent out via Phase Reps, social media, and website.
- Stephanie Proffitt presented maps of a new proposed bike path that encompasses over 27 acres of Ranch owned property. She provided maps and discussed getting a work party with tractors to assist with creating the path. A motion to move forward with phase two was made and approved unanimously.
- AFE # 289 was put off until a subsequent meeting in order to revise bids from split rail fence to lodge pole fence around the RV Park tent area.
- Vice President Beveridge has reviewed both the MOU's with Jefferson County for maintenance of Panorama Park and the Water Company for revenues from the Cell Towers. The Panorama Park MOU needs to be re-negotiated to provide for a more appropriate annual increase for restroom maintenance as well as separate charges for work beyond the scope of that maintenance. Panorama Park vandalism has increased exponentially. The Ranch has had to clean graffiti, excrement and fix vandalism which should be paid on a time and materials basis. The Water Co. MOU does not need revision but does need to be reviewed with the Water Co. BOD as is required by the MOU. All MOU's should be reviewed annually.
- Vice President Beveridge proposed looking into upgrading the microphones and possibly improving the Zoom experience by adding the Owl system. Fire Department Board Member Brad Pahl will lend the Owl to the Ranch for a trial at the next work session. Additionally, a motion to approve the purchase of a 12-microphone system was made and approved unanimously.
- Western Christmas Celebration is December 2. The Mitten Tree is up in the Administration Office. Donations will be donated to various schools and organizations in the area. The Fire Dept is organizing Shop with a Fire Fighter and they also have a Giving Tree available.
- The Regular meeting was adjourned at 7:34 pm. Executive Session was called to order at 7:38pm. Executive Session was adjourned, and Open Session reopened at 8:14pm.
 - A motion to engage in a new contract with the Steel Stampede promoters was made by Director Randall, seconded by Vice President Beveridge. A vote of -0- in favor and 8 opposed defeated the motion. A motion to renegotiate the Panorama Park MOU with Jefferson County was made by Director Randall, seconded by Secretary Dries and approved unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 8:15pm.


