Deschutes County seeks input on intersection improvement concept designs near Crooked River Ranch

The Deschutes County Road Department is requesting input on design concepts to improve traffic flow and safety at NW Lower Bridge Way and NW 43rd Street near Crooked River Ranch. Improvements at the intersection are designated as a high-priority project in the County's Transportation System Plan.

The proposed intersection improvement concepts focus on improving traffic flow into and out of Crooked River Ranch and improving safety for cyclists. The three design concepts include a roundabout, a re-alignment of NW 43rd Street and a right-turn lane enhancement to support road users turning right onto NW 43rd Street.

Community input about these initial concepts is being collected via a virtual open house, which is active until Friday, April 19. Members of the public can rank each concept numerically and provide comments on the concepts. The virtual open house is available at the following web address: www.deschutes.org/LBW_43rd

Public input will assist the project team in the selection of preferred concept for design.

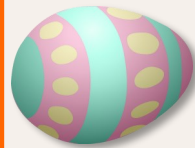
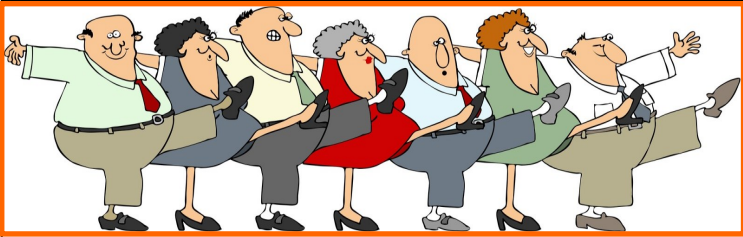

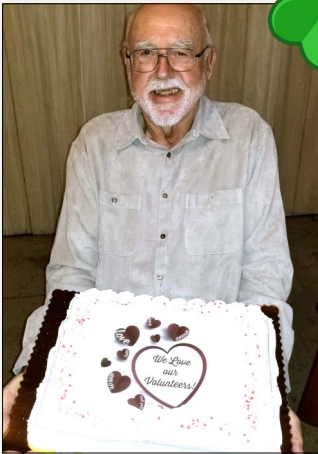

Bingo is back! Saturday, March 23rd, saw a group of eager players. Refreshments were available and prizes were varied.

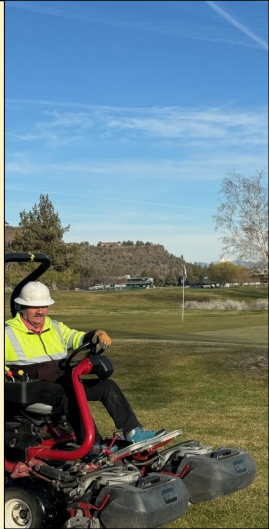

Supporting Permanent Protections for Oregon’s Owyhee Canyonlands

The Owyhee Canyonlands span from southeast Oregon into south-west Idaho, and they are one of the most remote, intact landscapes in the Western U.S. The area contains millions of acres of deep rugged canyons, rolling sagebrush grasslands and rushing rivers, and boasts some of the darkest night skies in the country.

Currently, only five percent of the Owyhee Canyonlands is permanently protected, leaving this natural treasure vulnerable to looming threats of industrial development and climate change. In the last decade, Oregon has already lost 200,000 football fields worth of open land to development and other human factors and ranks near last among other western states in terms of protected public land.

Now, a diverse coalition of organizations and advocates calling for President Biden to establish an Owyhee Canyonlands National Monument based on a vision offered by Oregon Senators Ron Wyden and Jeff Merkley, has come together to develop a broadly-supported, visionary proposal to protect this incredible wilderness in Oregon’s high desert. In fact, nearly 80 percent of Oregonians want the Owyhee Canyonlands protected.

On April 20, Karly Foster of the Oregon Natural Desert Association (ONDA), will present a Lens On Learning program called **Supporting Permanent Protections for Oregon’s Owyhee Canyonlands**, speaking about the progress of the national campaign to designate an Owyhee Canyonlands National Monument by the end of 2024.

As campaign manager for ONDA, Foster has developed conservation campaign initiatives across millions of acres of Oregon’s high desert public lands at the local, regional and national levels and with Tribal Nations, by building relationships with diverse stakeholders and community partners to secure permanent protection for public lands, waters and wildlife.

Foster will discuss what’s happening with the Owyhee Canyonlands proposed legislation and how efforts by local groups like FANs are supporting

what is currently the largest conservation opportunity in the American West. Please join us for this important event.

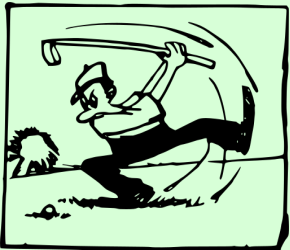
CRR Men's Golf Club April 2024

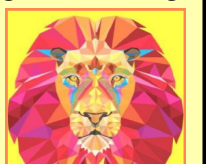

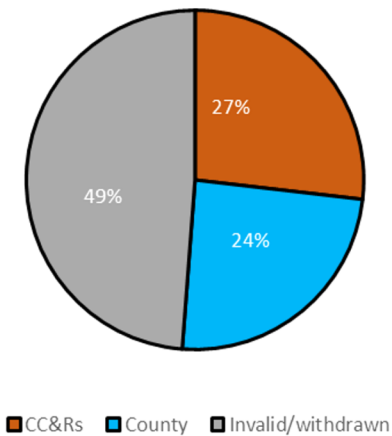


2023 CC&R Complaints Overview

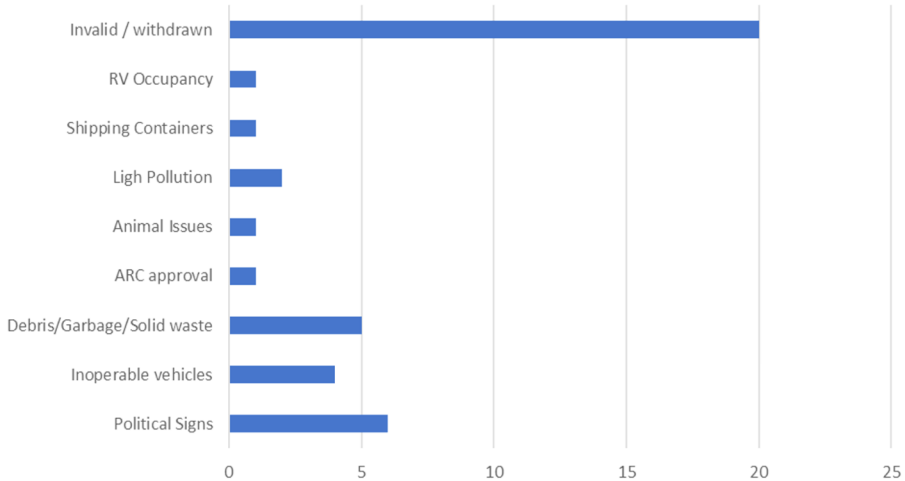

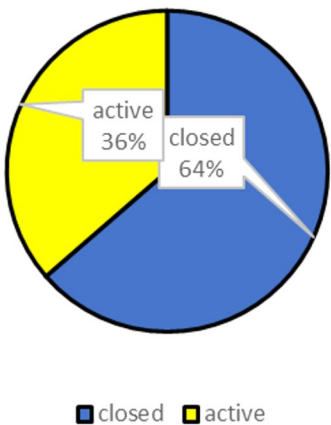
2023 Complaint Status

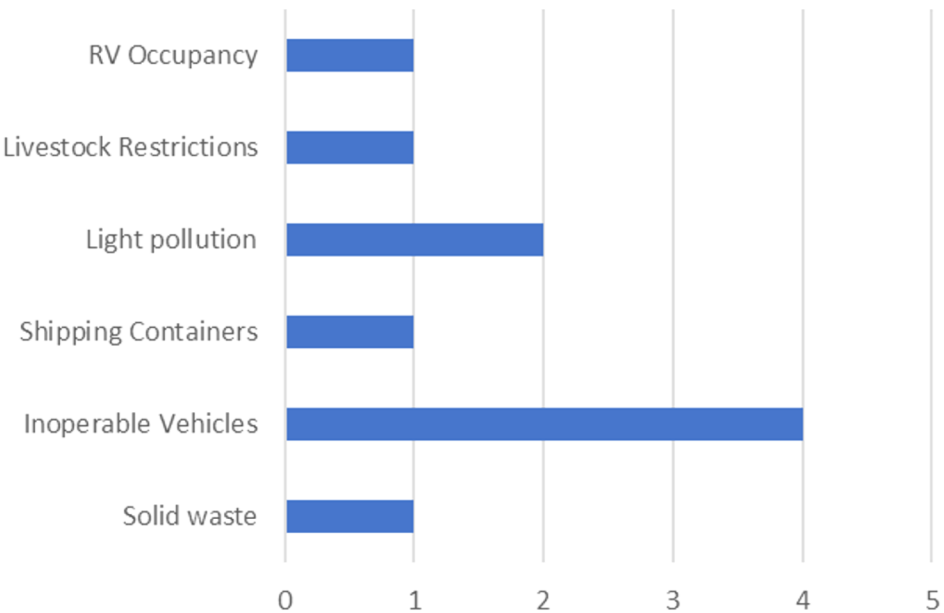

CC&R Committee Notice

Political Signs – Rules & Dates to Remember

“Federal, State and County election/political signs and/or flags may be displayed **60 days** before an election and must be removed within **3 days** after the completion of voting in Oregon”. (IV,L)

The Primary election is May 21, 2024. Political signs or flags will be allowed from March 21, 2024, through May 24, 2024.

The General election is November 5, 2024. Political signs or flags will be allowed from September 5, 2024, through November 8, 2024

“A political sign refers to a sign regarding a candidate running for political office or regarding a political issue to be considered in a current election”. (IV, L).

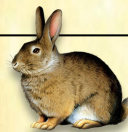
“A maximum combination of four signs and flags to be displayed per property at one time.” (IV, A)

“No flag shall exceed 24 feet in size. No sign shall exceed 5 square feet in size.” (IV, B)

“ No sign or flag shall be placed on any road right-of- way. Signs shall be set back from the physical road a minimum of 5 feet and cannot obstruct vision.” (Paraphrase from IV, C).

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

March 18, 2024

- The meeting was called to order by Vice President Beveridge. All Directors were present with the exception of President Vickery.
- Ranch Manager LaPora noted that accounts owing decreased by 113. Collections are doing well with a very large attorney account expected to settle soon with large monthly payments, paying off within 10 months.
- The Jefferson County Commissioner's meeting held in the Juniper Room on March 13 in the Juniper Room was well attended with standing room only.
- AFE # 288 – Duplex/Cart Barn Roof - AFE # 288 was modified to include the BOD requested ice and water shield over the entire three roofs. The estimate for the ice and water shield is \$3700 making a total amount of \$34,450. A motion to approve AFE #288 in the amount of \$34,450.00 was made and approved unanimously.
- It was announced that Secretary Mike Dries has resigned due to personal reasons. A motion to elect Julia Randall to fill the Secretary position was made unanimously.
- A motion to approve AFE #292 in the amount not to exceed \$92,000.00 for the purchase of a used water truck for the road department was made and approved unanimously. Expenditure was allotted for in the FY 2025 CRP but the BOD approved making the purchase now to replace the truck wrecked in October 2023.
- Treasurer Davis discussed recruiting interns from various schools that are pursuing a degree in either professional golf management or turf management. These would be considered seasonal employees and paid as such. There would be more attention to detail by these interns as they pursue their career choices. The Board was in favor of moving forward.
- Vice President Beveridge provided a summary of several RV Parks in the area which included site rates, and amenities. CRR RV Park is in the middle of all rates. Long Term stays starting this fall will include monthly electric rates.
- A motion to approve Gail DesBrisay and Joye Ross for the CC&R committee was made and approved unanimously.
- A motion to adopt FY 2025 Fee Schedule was made. It was adopted by of vote six in favor and one abstaining, with Secretary Randall abstaining. A motion to adopt FY 2025 Operating Budget was made and adopted unanimously.
- Jeremy Mickelson: asked the board to consider holding another rodeo at the current arena. The BOD is in favor of exploring the option. Ranch Manager LaPora and Vice President Beveridge will meet with the promoters to discuss.
- Meaghan Payton, owner of the Ranch Cabins, asked the Board for a letter of support to Jefferson County as she moves forward with building her additional nine cabins. A motion to write a letter of support was made and approved unanimously.
- A motion to adjourn the Regular meeting to Executive Session for legal issues was made. It was a unanimous decision to approve. The Regular meeting was adjourned at 7:09 pm. Executive Session was opened at 7:15pm. A motion to adjourn Executive Session at 7:28pm was made and approved unanimously. Open session was called back to order at 7:29pm and a motion to adjourn with no action taken was made and approved unanimously.

Meet the Yellow-Bellied Marmot

(*Marmota flaviventris*) by Trish Nevan

In Central Oregon, one of the surest signs of spring's arrival is hearing the sharp warning whistle of the yellow-bellied marmot. Emerging from hibernation in late February and early March, marmots, also called rockchucks or whistle-pigs, leave their underground dens and start nibbling away at succulent vegetation, insects and bird eggs.

Yellow-bellied marmots are the largest member of the squirrel family in Oregon, and can weigh up to 11 pounds. They are also fairly long-lived, averaging a lifespan of 13-15 years.

With their stubby legs, furry, plump bodies with golden-yellow under-side, and short, bushy tails these ground squirrels are easy to identify. Colonies of up to 20 marmots are often found in burrows near piles of rocks and boulders. They spend about 80 percent of their lives underground, and over half of the time hibernating. When they emerge in early spring, male marmots seek out two or three females to mate with, each producing up to five pups. They also become eating machines because they need to double their mass in preparation for their upcoming winter hibernation.

Marmots are well-equipped to dig. During summer months they will construct multiple burrows about three feet deep for daily use. Winter hibernation burrows, however, can be over 20 feet underground.

Marmots are hyper-alert to predators, such as coyotes and raptors, and communicate danger to other marmots with their warning whistle alarm calls. While they may look sluggish when munching on vegetation, they can move surprisingly quickly and disappear into a hole or pile of rocks when danger is perceived.

One of the best places locally to observe rockchucks is around Canyon Village at Crooked River Ranch. In spring and summer, dozens can easily be spotted eating grass and standing guard near rocky areas. But then one day, around the beginning of August, they suddenly disappear. The yellow-bellied marmots are back in their underground burrows, hibernating through the long winter.

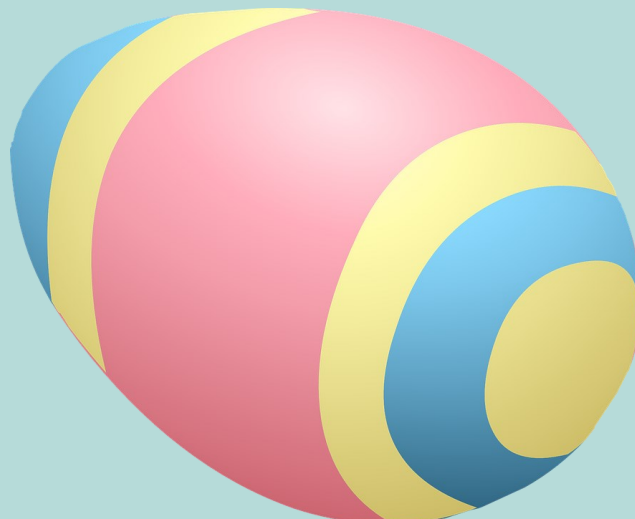

HORSEY FUN FACTS!

Horses don't actually sleep standing, but rather doze. They are able to do this through the stay apparatus, a special system of tendons and ligaments that enables a horse to lock the major joints in its legs. They must lie down for true R.E.M. sleep.

- Horses eyes are larger than any other mammal on land.
- Horses have nearly 360 degrees of vision. They cannot see directly in front of their nose, or directly behind their tail, this means they cannot see what they're eating.
- Horses cannot breathe through their mouths, vomit or burp.
- Horses have exceptional hearing, when they move their ears back and forth they are telling us a story. Straight forward: High alert or happy. Flat back: Angry, watch out! And everything in between.
- Horses feel things with their whiskers on their muzzle.
- An adult horses brain weighs approximately twenty-two ounces and is about the size of a walnut.
- The average horses heart weighs nine to ten pounds. Secretariat, the 1973 Triple Crown winner's heart was twice the size of an average horse weighing twenty-two pounds.
- Horses are measured in four inch increments or "hands" at the top of the withers. So a fifteen hand horse would be sixty inches at the withers. Hands are referred to as hh (hands high) after the number, when describing how tall a horse is, 15hh is describing a 60 inch horse.
- Baby horses are called foals, baby male horses are Colts and females are called Fillies until about four years of age. Colts are considered Stallions, and fillies are considered mares around that same age. Once a male horse is altered or castrated he becomes a gelding.

This is also the time of year to check out your defensible space, the area between your home and the grass, trees, shrubs, or wildland area surrounding it. By ensuring you have good defensible space around your home you reduce your risk of wildfire impacting it. Currently, there are a limited number of defensible space grants available. If you need more tips for defensible space, check out crrfire.org/defensible-space or call 541-923-6776 to request an on-site defensible space assessment.

To receive emergency alerts on your mobile phone, make sure you are signed up for Citizen Emergency Notifications from both Deschutes County 911 and Frontier Regional Alerts. In the event of a wildfire, natural disaster, or other emergency this is the primary way you would receive information. You can sign up by visiting crrfire.org and click on Emergency Alerts on the front page. If you've already signed up in the past, it's also a good idea to log in and verify all of your information is correct!

Super Bowl Sunday kept some of our members from attending our Feb. 11 meeting.

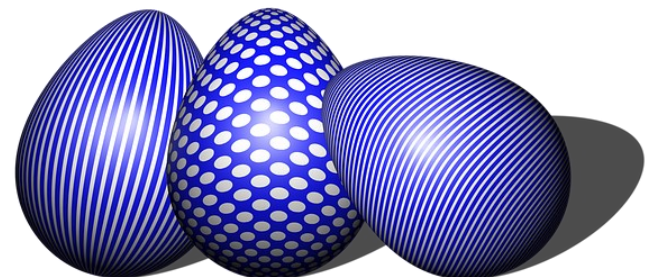

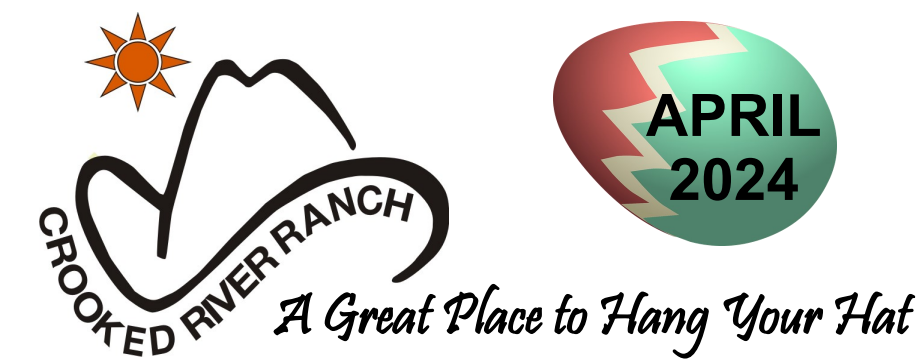

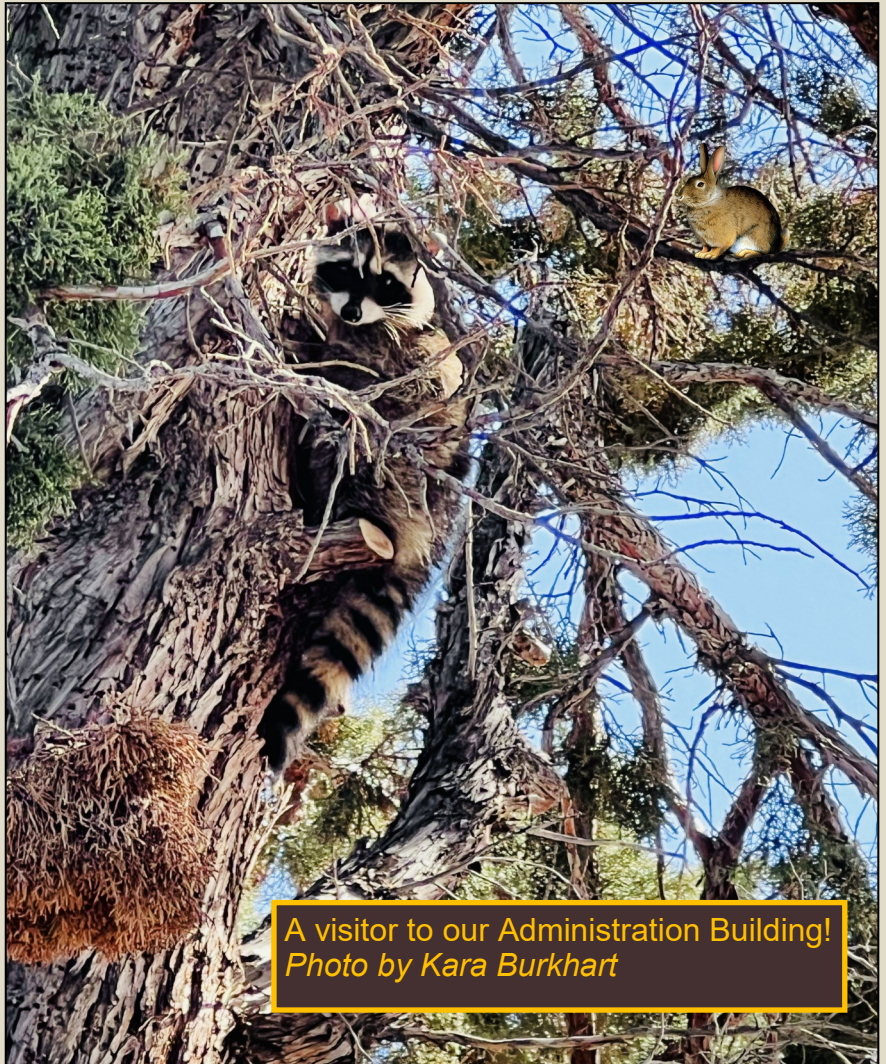
