We hope to see you there.



The volcanic landscapes of Oregon have been shaped by tectonic forces that are active on a global scale. In central and eastern Oregon, these forces interact to create a geologically diverse region of snow-covered volcanic peaks, landscapes created by faults, and some of the largest volcanic eruptions on earth. In this presentation Daniele McKay, geologist and instructor in the Department of Earth Sciences at the University of Oregon, will explore recent geologic research that has changed our understanding of Oregon's volcanic landscapes.

About Dr. McKay

Daniele McKay is a senior instructor in the Department of Earth Sciences at the University of Oregon. She lives in Bend, teaching online geology courses throughout the academic year and field courses in Central Oregon during the summer. Her research background is in physical volcanology with a focus on recent mafic eruptions in the Central Oregon Cascades. She is also interested in how societies prepare for and respond to natural disasters, especially volcanic eruptions and earthquakes.

She has worked with Deschutes County, the Oregon Office of Emergency Management, Oregon Partnership for Disaster Resilience, and the Red Cross on natural hazard preparedness and mitigation in central Oregon.



Wildlife of the Month: Mountain Bluebird, (sialia currucoides)

Mountain bluebirds are such a flashy sky blue color, you do not need to be a birding expert to recognize the male in his spring brilliance! These are a true favorite bird who will readily use a proper nest box in your back yard.

Our bluebirds sometimes stay in Central Oregon during the winter and will forage for insects and berries all winter long. Juniper berries are an im-

portant supplement. You can often watch bluebirds hover while hunting insects, but they also perch and pounce when spotting something juicy! The male will lose his blue color until spring returns.

Mates will find each other when time to find a nest site and they often use previously favored nests again. The female busily builds her nest by carrying grasses to line the nest and adding soft grasses, shredded juniper bark, feathers or even wool. The middle of the nest will be formed into a two-inch cup. She will then lay her eggs, one per day, until a total of four to six have been laid and incubate them for 12 to 14 days. The eggs are also a beautiful sky blue color.





After hatching, both parents participate in feeding the tiny, helpless chicks for about 20 days. The chicks are "altricial" which means they hatch with no feathers and are completely dependent upon their parents until learning to fly. Bluebirds have an

average lifespan of about six years but can live to ten years.

You may wish to build a mountain bluebird nest box and instructions can be found on the internet. The box entrance and height from the ground are important for attracting the birds. Be sure to protect the base of the stand from predators. Snakes can easily climb a wood post.

Participate in a "Walk About" to view mountain bluebird and American kestrel nest boxes. This easy, level hike includes stops at ten nest boxes to monitor condition of the nests, eggs present, baby birds—and some surprises!

We will meet at the end of the gravel section of Peninsula Road where there is a cattle grate and kiosk. We will hike in on Peninsula Drive along the Crooked River rim, leaving the road at times to walk short distances to check nest boxes. This road has some rocky, uneven terrain, but it is generally easy to walk.

Wear comfortable closed-toe shoes and comfortable hiking clothes with layers. Bring water and a snack. Bring binoculars if you have them. FANs will have binoculars available for loan for those who need them. We will leave promptly at 7:00 a.m., so please be punctual.

Group size is limited to six people, and pets are not allowed on this hike. If you sign up and later need to cancel, please do so as soon as possible so that people on the wait list can join this hike.

Driving directions: The trailhead is located within the Crooked River Ranch community. Travel north on Chinook Drive. Turn left onto SW Mustang Road. Take the first right to stay on SW Mustang Road. Turn right onto SW Shad Road. Turn right onto SW Peninsula Drive.

Native Plant of the Month The Spectacular Bitterroot!

Beware!

Bulbous bluegrass may soon be making an appearance in a yard near you. Unlike most weedy grasses, bulbous bluegrass is a perennial and much harder to pull out of the ground manually than an annual grass. It grows from basal bulbs, which you can see if you knock the dirt off the roots. The leaves are narrow and dark green. This grass is highly invasive, because instead of reproducing by seeds, it produces tiny green bulblets with purplish bases on the flowering stalksactually tiny plants ready to root as


soon as they hit the dirt and requiring no pollination or germination. When shed, the bulblets quickly claim space before most native grass seeds have even germinated.

Bulbous bluegrass can be mistaken for Canby's (aka Sandberg) bluegrass. However, Canby's is often the first native bunchgrass to green up in the early spring, and bulbous bluegrass appears a few months later in the season. If there are seed heads present, it's easy to tell the 'shaggy" green bulbous bluegrass seed heads from the Canby's bluegrass' red or purple, narrow, spike-like seed heads. If you are unsure, dig a small one up to check for "bulbous" roots—a sure sign of bulbous bluegrass. Also, as it matures over several years, a dead area forms in the center of the bunch, with a circle of green growth around it.

Since it is a perennial with extensive roots, bulbous bluegrass cannot be controlled by mowing or burning. And do not add to your compost! Due to the bulbous roots and bulblets, the plant must be dug up entirely and disposed of in the trash or at the limb dump. A certified sprayer can help with larger outbreaks. This plant is classified as "obnoxious" in Jefferson County, meaning it is a nuisance but is so widespread that it is not a top priority.

Bitterroot,

a late spring perennial, is a complete surprise when you find the delicate white-to-deep rose flowers appearing to grow right out of the barren gravely ground along the basalt canyon rims in the high desert. Where are the leaves and stems? Well, by the time the flower blooms, there are none.

If you find these wildflowers in April, all you will see is a strange circle of fleshy, finger-like green leaves growing from an unseen

stem. As the plants develop, you will find a bring pink bud in the center. These fleshy leaves store the moisture required for the plant to bloom in the harsh, dry conditions where it grows.

Each flower has twelve to eighteen petals above five to nine sepals, under which there is a whorl of four to six bracts. The Deschutes Canyon rim is an excellent place to find them. In Crooked River Ranch, your best bet if the Sand Ridge Trail. Be sure to walk out onto the promontories where these flowers can be prolific.


The first session is July 15 - 19 and the second is July 22 - 26.




