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



If you have been down to the golf course or pickleball courts this spring, you can hardly miss the beautiful Crooked River Ranch Native Plant Interpretive Garden.

Eight years ago this raised planting area, between the golf course and the parking lot, was home to the invasive myrtle spurge and non-native cactus. FANS native plant coordinator, Marilynne Keyser, had a vision for a native plant garden showcasing the wonderful and varied plants that are native to the high desert, and thrive in our climate and limited rainfall.

This past winter, plans for a garden refresh and new plant signage began. With the help of Andria Truax, owner of Great Basin Nursery in Bend, Marilynne, and native plant enthusiasts, Linda and Wayne Buttolph, developed a plan to refresh the garden. A new look with additional plants, a new garden path for close up plant viewing, and new plant signage took shape. The new plants were added in April, and thanks to a wetter than normal spring, the entire garden is thriving. Our new garden path is graveled and will make for year round enjoyment of the garden. New signage is ordered, and will be in place soon.

If you haven't had a chance to see the garden, it is in full bloom, despite the nibbling by local deer. There will be a wonderful opportunity for a plant tour during the CRR Independence Celebration on July 1st. Visit the vendors and the FANS information booth from 10:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. at Macpherson Park. There will be plant lists available for self -guided tours, or sign up for a morning or afternoon FANS guided tour at 10:00 a.m. or 1:00 p.m.

# Trailering a horse, common sense rules of the road

It's THAT time of year again. Horse events, trail riding the many beautiful trails of Oregon, and horsecamping! Many horse owners consider their horse to be a part of their family. They treat them as such in their daily care, but it also includes loading that family member into a horse trailer and heading for a day (or more) of horse activities in Central Oregon and beyond. Vehicles and trailers are maintained to keep horses comfortable and safe during the drive because that's what you do for family members.

Every time a horse owner decides to haul a horse, there is risk involved. Most horses load easily and know nothing different than being driven from home and back safely. Many thousands of hours and miles are driven with no collisions. However, over 800 wrecks involving horse trailers are reported annually in the United States. The results are horrifying! Photos of dead or injured horses will not be shown in this article, but it happens. Although most drivers behind the wheel of OTHER vehicles are careful and cautious, there are those who are not. Some people simply have no understanding of what it is like to haul a horse – a living, breathing 1,000 pound creature that stands on four slim legs while adjusting its body with the sway of the trailer. It is not the same as hauling a load of yard debris, a boat or trailer. This is written to educate those who are willing to listen to a few "rules of the road" when following a vehicle pulling a horse trailer. Thank you to those who are already well aware and are courteous and cautious drivers. Horse owners appreciate you!

Horse owners know drivers in vehicles behind horse trailers can be annoyed by a slower moving vehicle in front of them. They do their best to keep up with traffic, but there are limitations when hauling a horse. Slower is generally better. Some suggest five miles under the speed limit. Horse trailers are heavy and, as such, do not accelerate quickly nor do they slow or stop as quickly as a passenger vehicle. They are unable to pull rapidly into traffic. Horse owners keep a good distance from the vehicle in front of them, knowing it is essential to their safety. If it is necessary to change lanes, it is done gradually. Uphill travel is the most taxing on a rig pulling a horse trailer. Horse owners will pull over if it is safe and/or necessary.

Horse owners appreciate those drivers who give them distance when following. That is the most important request. When passing, give plenty of distance coming back in front of the rig pulling a horse trailer. Vehicles in close proximity are most likely to be the ones that cause collisions. No surprise there. Darting in front of a vehicle pulling a trailer is dangerous.

As for horse owners, they are responsible for driving sensibly, too. Keeping horses' head INSIDE the trailer is imperative.

If all horse owners and non-horse owners follow these simple rules of the road, we can all arrive with our "family members" at our destinations safely.






# Why don't they grade this road!!!????

If you live on a gravel road or drive on one here on the Ranch, you have probably experienced washboard roads - horizontal bumps and ruts that feel like a series of small speed bumps. Washboard makes driving on your road uncomfortable and downright dangerous, on top of causing damage to your vehicle. It's that aggravating, teeth-jarring pattern that shakes your steering wheel and beats the heck out of your suspension. And if you're towing anything behind your vehicle, you better hope it can handle the extra strain! To save yourself and your vehicle from this nasty jolt, learn the simple trick to prevent washboard on your gravel road.

The cause of washboard roads is simple physics: have you ever noticed how wind blowing over a body of water makes ripples? Or how the waves in a lake or ocean make the sand at the bottom into a washboard pattern? Or how windy, snow covered mountains sometimes appear to have ripples? This is the same principle that causes washboard roads. Vehicles moving over gravel or dirt, especially at high speeds, move the material and eventually cause a series of uniform ripples to form. Our dry climate makes the situation even worse. Small washboard bumps have even been known to form on steel railroad tracks after prolonged use.

Many people find that driving relatively fast over the rough road feels better. It does. You minimize the vibration inside the car, but at a great risk. Understand that at higher speeds your tires are in less contact with the road as they bounce from ridge to ridge. That means only a small fraction of the tire is making contact with the road. Turning and stopping distances are reduced dramatically on an already loose surface. It's similar to driving over a slippery surface. Add in high speeds, and you're asking for trouble. You might think it's better to drive fast but the rapid up and down motion puts tremendous stress on the suspension and causes shocks to heat up and fail. The vehicle may feel level to you because your suspension is taking all the abuse. All that vibration and pounding cause bolts to loosen and parts to crack. Worn tie rod ends,

worn out bushings and CV joints are possible, among other problems.

The most effective way to get rid of it is to grade the road. Grading will loosen up the gravel or dirt that has become compacted and spread it around evenly, leaving you with a smooth, even road and a comfortable ride.

The Crooked River Ranch Road Department gets multiple complaints monthly about washboard roads. "Why don't they grade this road?" they yell. Well, The Road Department makes every effort to grade all Ranch roads at least once each year. BUT it is a lost cause if our community does not do its part to prevent wash-boarding.

YOU can prevent washboard from forming on Ranch roads by following one simple rule: DON'T DRIVE TOO FAST!

Our Road Department has no authority to enforce speed limits, etc., it's up to each of us to do the right thing.

Studies have shown that if traffic stays under 20 mph washboards will form very slowly. So, the key to prevent washboard (for the most part) is to stay under 20 mph. I realize this may not be preferred but slowing down will make a huge difference. On top of reducing the creation of wash boards, going slower will also significantly reduce dust. Let's all be considerate of our neighbors, our community and the hard-working people who try to keep your roads in tip top shape.

#### **Crooked River Ranch Crime Watch** *May 2022*

There were 1458 county wide calls made to Jefferson County Sheriff Department in the month of May. CRR actions and calls for service: 276.

Of a total of 92 incidents in the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department <u>Press</u> <u>Log</u> for the period May 1, 2023, through June 4, 2023, twelve (12) involved Crooked River Ranch.

- On May 3, a Deputy with the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office investigated a complaint of damage to property on SW Corral Place. The Deputies investigation led to the arrest of a resident for Criminal Mischief III.
- On May 4, a Detective received and reviewed a DHS Cross Report regarding children living in Crooked River Ranch. The information provided did not report a crime. DHS closed their case at screening.



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# FANs Weed of the Month, Myrtle Spurge All that glitters is not gold By Penny Radtke, FANs Weeds Coordinator



All that glitters is not Gold! And Myrtle Spurge is a good example of that. This handsome groundcover that is widely used locally in rock gardens has been in the news recently. You may have seen the story on KTVZ about its toxic and dangerous characteristics that are being highlighted by the OSU Extension Service. Here is the link: Invasive, noxious weed popping up in C. Oregon gardens prompts warning: Handle myrtle spurge with caution - KTVZ

Ornamentals that stay put are not considered to be a problem, but this plant happens to be poisonous, and it doesn't stay put! Myrtle Spurge is legendary for escaping home gardens and once it escapes it quickly crowds out native plants. In Jefferson, Deschutes, and Crook Counties, it is on the B-list of noxious weeds, which means: "Intensive containment, control and monitoring by the landowner is required."

All parts of Myrtle Spurge contain a caustic latex sap that is attractive to children, and can result in skin irritation, redness, swelling, blisters, and possibly anaphylactic shock. Ingesting the sap will cause nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea, and there is a possibility of blindness if the sap comes into contact with the eyes!

Myrtle spurge is a perennial that blooms April to June. Flowers are small, surrounded by showy yellow bracts. It grows 6-14 inches tall, and has blue-green, fleshy, triangular -shaped leaves arranged in spirals around the stems.

Hopefully, you are inspired to PURGE YOUR SPURGE! Small infestations can be controlled through multiple years of digging up at least 4 inches of the root, preferably in the spring before seeds are produced. BE SURE TO WEAR LONG SLEEVES, GOOD GLOVES, AND EYE PROTECTION. Bag all plant parts and dispose of them in the garbage-do not compost and DO NOT BURN! Myrtle spurge can also be effectively controlled with products containing 2,4-D and dicamba (i.e., Weed-B-Gon) applied in the fall, according to Jefferson County Weed Depart-

FANs Flower of the Month, Monkeyflowe Three species at Crooked River Ranch *By* Marilynne Keyser, FANs Native Plants Coordinator



What is a monkeyflower and how did it get its name? I'll answer the second question first—the 150 species around the world have a mouth-like shape and to some they resemble the face of a monkey. Monkeyflowers are small, lowgrowing incredibly colorful five-petaled tubular flowers in their own genetic family. Originally, all monkeyflowers were in a single genus, Minimus. The diversity among the 150

species is incredible and they were recently split into four separate genuses, with only one of species remaining in the original genus.

According to an August 29, 2019 article in Science by Elizabeth Pennisi:

University of Washington plant molecular biologist H. D. "Toby" Bradshaw and his graduate student showed slides documenting as much

floral diversity within a single monkeyflower species... as can be seen in the meadows and streambanks of the Cascades-all generated by mutating the genome of this one Mimulus species.

We have three species here at Crooked River Ranch:

Deschutes Monkeyflower (Diplacus deschutensis) rarely grows to 10 inches. The opposite leaves are oblong with sharply pointed tips. The pink to magenta flowers have five mostly equal lobes with yellow bands in the



throat that are dotted and outlined with a darker magenta. Is is only found along the Middle Deschutes River. You can find it in the sandy, gravelly soil on the southwest side of the Scout Camp Trail,

Common Monkeyflower (Erythranthe guttata) has erect to spreading fleshy stems. The opposite leaves are oval to round. The lemon yellow petals are speckled with red dots. It is only found in seeps under rock overhangs, springs and wet meadows. You can find it under a large overhanging rock about half way across the Scout Camp Trail. You will need to scramble up to see it.



Dwarf Monkeyflower (Diplacus namus) has hairy, oval leaves that are purple on the underside. The magenta flowers have a darker magenta throat with yellow markings. It can be found on open flats of dry, sandy or gravelly soil around the ranch.


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# Lower Bridge/Hwy 97 Interchange Project Update
