# Candidate Sign Guidelines for Election 2024

All Candidate signs must comply with all sign guidelines dated May 16, 2022. (see website: Association, Governing Documents)

No candidate signs may be placed on private property within CRR without the expressed permission of the property owner. No candidate signs may be placed on road *rights-of-way* on CRR---35 feet from the center of road, or 3 feet behind the power line. Candidate signs must not be erected earlier than July 1<sup>st</sup> and are to be removed by September 3, 2024--within three (3) days after the last ballot due date. In the event of a special election, signs shall be erected no earlier than a date established by the Board of Directors and must be removed no later than three (3) days following the last ballot due date for said election.

The physical size of any candidate sign shall be limited to dimensions prescribed by Crooked River Ranch CC&R limitations regarding real estate "for sale" signs, and will not exceed five square feet in area.

Any candidate for office or spokesman for any political group wishing to place any campaign signs on the Ranch are required to sign a statement that they will abide by these limitations at the time of filing for office.

Failure to agree or abide by these limitations may restrict the violator from appearing in the candidate section of the CRR Newsletter. Failure may also initiate the placement of a statement, by the CRR Board of Directors, in the voter's pamphlet that would identify any candidate or political group unwilling to abide by the resolution.

Any sign or notices in violation of this resolution may be removed by CRR staff.

The Board of Directors of CRR will have the duty to enforce and uphold all actions as outlined above.

# **Guidance for Campaign Statement**

Applicants for nomination to open positions of the Board of Directors or Architectural Review Committee must submit a campaign statement of 300 words or less. Campaign statements for applicants selected for the slate of candidates will be published in the Association Newsletter and Voters Pamphlet. The campaign statement will be published as received. No grammatical or spelling corrections will be made (but defamatory or inappropriate language would be expunged). If provided, a photo will be published with the campaign statement in both publications.

The Campaign Statement is an opportunity to speak directly to the voters and make the candidate's case for election. It should contain biographic information, a discussion of qualifications based on work experience, education or training, and a clear statement of why the candidate is running for the position.

To make it easier for the voters to compare the candidates, please use the following format:

  Guidelines). Updated documents to be submitted to Board of Directors (BOD).
- Applicant package, schedule of election 2024 events, special rules and procedures posted by Admin Staff on web site and hard copies available at Admin Office for pick-up.
- Nominating Committee meets to review generic *voter's pamphlet, sample ballot* and *voting instructions* for newsletter and mailings to be finalized after BOD announcement of slate of candidates.
- Nominating Committee meets to review applications and discuss additional potential candidates to be encouraged to apply.
- May 31. 2024 (May use letter-drop at Admin Office) Deadline for submission to Admin Office of application package for prospective candidates to Admin Office for transmission to Nominating Committee.
- <u>Date TBD</u> Nominating Committee meets for final committee review of slate of candidates for the Board of Directors and Architectural Committee to be presented to the Board of Directors at the June 17, 2024 BOD Regular Meeting. The Committee also approves package of candidate-provided information to be published in the July newsletter; and finalizes voter's pamphlet, sample ballot and voting instructions for mailings to be submitted to the Board of Directors at the June 17<sup>th</sup> Regular BOD meeting.
- June 17, 2024- Nominating Committee presents its slate of candidates and voting materials to Board of Directors. Board approves ballot.
- <u>Date TBD</u> Nominating Committee meets to ensure candidates informed of Candidates Forum and conduct critique of 2024 election process and develop lessons learned.
- <u>July 15, 2024 4:30pm Juniper Room</u> Candidates Forum to be held before regular BOD Meeting-Nominating Committee members encouraged to attend.
- August 1, 2024 Ballots must be mailed to members eligible to vote no later than this date along with *Notice of Annual Meeting of Members*.
- August 17. 2024. 9 AM CRRC&MA Annual meeting includes opportunity to meet the candidates-additional candidates may be nominated by members at annual meeting. Nominating Committee members encouraged to attend.
- August 31, 2024- Mailed completed ballots due at Auditor's Office. Ballots may also be deposited at the Admin Office ballot box up to 4 PM. No Nominating Committee action.
- <u>September 4, 2024</u> All candidates notified of results and results posted on website and at Admin Office. Final act of Nominating Committee 2024 is to ensure that candidates are informed of election results. BOD elected members are sworn in and seated at Work Session.

# **Board Candidate Instructions 2024**

A minimum of three Board positions will be open for the September 2024 election. Individuals who consider themselves qualified must follow the process as laid out according to Policy and Procedures Handbook - Policy 4.14.

- 1. Any member in "good standing" may run for the board. In "good standing" is defined as having "all" Association dues and any outstanding debts to the Association current according to Board policy and having no outstanding County code and CC&R violations at the time of application.
- 2. Application submission deadline is Friday, May 31, 2024 at 4:00p.m. Application packets can be picked up at the Administration building.
- 3. Application packet information will include:

  - **B.** Request to be a Candidate Form
  - C. Guidance for Campaign Statement
  - D. Applicant Information Sheet

# Central Oregon's focal landscape:

# **Deschutes National Forest & Crooked River National Grassland**

The Central Oregon Landscape covers State, county, private and federally managed lands on the eastside of the Central Cascades. This area is experiencing the fastest and most extensive community growth in Oregon with some communities increasing nearly 30% in the past 10 years. Hundreds of thousands of acres of public land are adjacent to homes, subdivisions and valuable private land assets; and with human ignitions accounting for nearly 90% of wildfires nationwide, every fire puts our communities at risk.

Under the Wildfire Crisis Strategy (WCS), the Deschutes National Forest and Crooked River National Grassland are pioneering improvements to project planning to increase the pace and scale of wildfire risk reduction in our communities and across the landscape.

We are an area rich in collaborative successes from implementing the Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration program and Joint Chief's Projects to executing the National Cohesive Strategy. Additional investments will build upon that success to continue reducing the risk of fire to numerous growing communities and critical infrastructure.

Central Oregon's economy is driven by recreation and tourism. The Deschutes National Forest is the primary destination, setting, and background for this economy. In 2021, in trail trips alone, \$136 million was spent in Deschutes County. Additionally, two popular Oregon State Parks border the Crooked River National Grassland–Smith Rock is internationally recognized as a rock-climbing destination and Lake Billy Chinook is a well-known destination for fishing and water sports. Mitigating wildland fire risks is not only critical for public safety, but it also contributes to a sustainable and robust local economy.

Launched in 2021 by the U.S.
Forest Service, the Wildfire Crisis
Strategy is a robust, 10-year plan
to address western wildfires in the
places where they pose the most
immediate threats to communities.
The strategy combines a historic
investment of congressional
funding with years of scientific
research and planning into a
national effort that will dramatically
increase the scale of forest health
treatments over the next decade.

Due to Central Oregon's high-risk for extreme wildfire, our region was chosen as one of the initial focal landscapes identified for targeted investments.

Central Oregon will receive up to \$43.1 million in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) funding to implement the Wildfire Crisis Strategy through 2024. With that investment, the Deschutes National Forest and Crooked River National Grassland along with Tribal, State and local partners, expect to treat more than 50,000 acres by 2024.

# National effort, local benefits

While the hiring and planning processes are ongoing, the Forest Service has been collaborating with partners to educate our school-aged youth and engage the public on the work that is being done and accomplish more work on the ground.

- Through the Wildfire Crisis Strategy, the Clackamas County Fire District No. 1. will provide increased opportunity to engage in prescribed fire and fuels reduction projects with a large element of cross training while completing important fuels reduction projects in an interagency collaborative environment, further facilitating effective collaboration across organizational
- Discover Your Forest, the non-profit partner of the Deschutes and Ochoco National Forests and Crooked River National Grassland, hired a wildland fire education coordinator. This new position plans and hosts community events, develops fire ecology curriculum for local youth and cultivates relationships with local fire education and mitigation specialists for outreaching into Central Oregon communities.
- Discover Your Forest is also spearheading a new volunteer group to serve as a conduit for delivering information related to the Wildfire Crisis Strategy at popular trailheads adjacent to areas that have or are currently undergoing landscape treatments. The program, and the newly hired Forest Stewards coordinator position, are funded in part by the Wildfire Crisis Strategy.
- The Crooked River National Grassland has entered into a Good Neighbor Agreement with the Oregon Department of Forestry to assist in planning invasive weed treatments and completing archaeological surveys on the Crooked River National Grassland
- In coordination with the Mt. Hood National Forest, the Deschutes National Forest and Crooked River National Grassland are working with the Klamath Tribes, Burns-Paiute Tribes and the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs to share information and resources and to coordinate treatments across boundaries to maximize efficiencies.

By taking steps to meaningfully address the wildfire crisis in the west in our own Central Oregon communities, we can preserve and protect our unique and cherished way of life for generations to come.

#### Years 1-2: First Steps

During the first two years of work on the Central Oregon Landscape, the Deschutes National Forest and Crooked River National Grassland have focused on securing partnerships to assist in implementation, and hiring more firefighters, environmental planners, wildlife biologists, archaeologists and other personnel needed to plan and implement future projects. Adding this additional capacity is possible through funding support provided by the Wildfire Crisis Strategy via the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (enacted by Congress in Fiscal Year 2022) and the Inflation Reduction Law (enacted by Congress in Fiscal year 2023).


## Year 3 and beyond


Multiple projects are slated to be implemented in Fiscal Year 2024 and beyond. These projects include treatments to thin overgrown forests, reintroduce low intensity fire back into a fire-adapted ecosystem, improve watershed conditions, remove invasive species and more.


#### But we can't do this work alone.
